ANTI-RACIST/BIAS STATEMENT

The School of Theatre acknowledges the mistakes we have made dealing with systemic racism, bias, and prejudice, much like the rest of America. We wholeheartedly believe in the following words of Ibram X. Kendi: "The opposite of racist isn't 'not racist.' It is anti-racist." To the School of Theatre, this means that we will educate our faculty, staff, and students about anti-racist practices. This looks like creating systemic change through workshops, continuing education, and professional development centered around anti-racist practices, theatrical intimacy, and bettering ourselves in service of our diverse and intersectional student body. This feels like educating and empowering our students, faculty, and staff to recognize and speak out against racism and damaging, outdated theatre practices. We are committed to this daily practice of unlearning, growth, and change.

Director's Notes

the [where.else] project was born from the need to engage with the greensboro community, as well as to bring new performance opportunities for our students after losing one of the school of theatre's stages due to renovations. as i was offered to direct this project, i had to let creativity lead the way. to do this, i focused on actively listening to our needs as a school and find a community partner that can foster a space for community and creativity.

'where am I right now?' – you may ask. many of us ask the same question upon entering elsewhere for the first time!

"elsewhere is a world-renowned artist residency and museum in greensboro, north carolina. "the collection" of objects in this 3-story former furniture, fabric, military surplus and second-hand store were amassed by sylvia gray over the course of 58-years. when sylvia passed away her grandson declared that none of this collection would leave the space and nothing else would be acquired. the space now provides material and context for site-specific artistic experimentation and interdisciplinary collaboration such that the collection and the art are continually repurposed and reimagined by the residents who create in it." (elsewhere's museum website)

since moving to greensboro in 2021, i have been in connection with the elsewhere museum and on 2022, i became a board member and currently serve as the secretary. i have always been fascinated by the energy of the space, the eternal cycle of destruction and creation and their connection with the local and national community. when deciding who the partner for this project could be, i did not hesitate to consider elsewhere as my first option.

[where.else] arrives as a forum for students to engage in collective creation (devising) while sharing lived experiences and differences to find common grounds in order to develop new material. through this democratic practice, WE gathered plenty of material that was generated from acting improvisations, images, games, drawings, and writings to start conceptualizing this production. after collecting the material, they were transformed into topics that eventually became questions. these questions were formulated as a collective and each student brought those questions to interview their own communities and report back their findings with the ensemble during rehearsals.

Director's Notes Continued

based on all the findings from the workshops, WE arrived at the topic of Collective Liberation. Collective Liberation proposes the idea that none of US are free until everyone is free and that even though many of our struggles are different, there are also intersections. it is at those intersections where the students found each other. "collective Liberation claims that all life is entangled, inseparable, permeable and eternally woven together. it rejects individualism, celebrates collaboration, and acknowledges the difficulty of the fact that we need each other, collective liberation is a labor of love-justice, an outcome of transformation. it does not come by way of institutions, it will not be handed down from thrones of power, and it does not repeat patterns of domination. it is ground-up business. it is relational. it is tender and poetic and fierce" (enfleshed collective), as this anchor topic arrived, it was impossible to ignore the fact that we were already approaching the work in the same vein and that this was another sign of the intersectional web between the cast, elsewhere and our respective communities. with this project, WE are not exclusively emphasizing the importance of collective engagement and creation, but also having the actors in the central role in the creative process, as opposed to an interpreter of somebody else's creativity. WE are not aiming at stating facts but rather, raise questions. this is not a final product but rather, a work in progress that never ends.

i want to end my notes by thanking all our actor-creators, poets, artists, devisers, musicians, dramaturgists, singers, dancers, authors, prophets in this project and to Amy Holroyd for diving into the unknown headfirst. i also want to give a huge and special shoutout to the elsewhere museum and Kerri Mubaarak for opening the space to uncg's school of theatre and for continuously dreaming of new, creative, and solidary futures with our community.
